Although we organised the event, it would not have been such a success without the organisations and people that helped on the day and next morning clearing up. The list is quite extensive to name everyone here, but I'd like you all to know that we really appreciated the help and effort, and personally, I want to thank you all from the bottom of my heart for helping to make the event such a success over the years.

Finally, I'd like to thank you, the people of Long Stratton for turning up in droves each year to make all the effort of putting on the event so worthwhile.

We don't know what the future holds, especially with these current trying times, but hopelfully somone will pick up the baton to continue where we left off.

Neighbourhood Plan

Following the independent examination of the Neighbourhood Plan, South Norfolk Council have issued a decision statement, approving that the plan should proceed to a referendum, subject to the specified modifications.

The referendum will allow local electors to vote on whether they wish to see the Plan implemented or not. If it passes a local referendum and is subsequently adopted by South Norfolk Council, it will become part of the statutory Development Plan for the area and will be used to help determine planning applications in the parish.

At the time of writing we are awaiting the referendum announcement from South Norfolk Council.

This is a very exciting stage and we do hope you are able to participate in this referendum!

Edward Arthur Bailey

Stoker K17125, Royal Navy

Edward was born on 23rd April 1891 at Tibenham, son of Emily Bailey. In 1898 Emily married Robert Barrett of Bustards Green in Forncett and Edward attended Wacton School with his step brother Jesse Robert Barrett.

By 1908 both boys had left school and moved to Yorkshire to find work, after a few years Jesse returned to Forncett but by 1912 Edward had joined the Navy as a stoker serving on HMS Astrea, Westminster, Princess Royal and Victory.

Oddly Edward is listed on the Wacton Roll of Honour but not his step brother Jesse who was in the Norfolk Regiment and died of his wounds in December 1917.

After the war Edward married in Norwich then moved to Suffolk, he died in 1972 at Deben in Suffolk

William Betts

Private 2317 Norfolk Regiment Sapper 131886 Royal Engineers

The William Betts on the Wacton Roll of Honour appears to be the grandson of William Betts, a widower, who moved to Wacton Common from Pulham in 1906.

In 1901 William senior and his wife Maria were living at Pulham with their grandson Willie, aged 17. Willie enlisted in the Norfolk Regiment in 1904.

He entered the war on 19th December 1915 at Alexandria Egypt as part of 54th (East Anglian) Division, 163rd Norfolk and Suffolk Brigade including 1/4th and 1/5th Battalions Norfolk Regiment. Later he transferred to the Royal Engineers as Sapper 131886.

After the war he was demobilised on 3rd July 1919 but retained in the files of the Z reserves. It is not known if he returned to the Wacton area. (134w)

These men complete the names on Wacton's Roll of Honour. I assume the Roll of Honour was completed around 1920 when the War Memorial was erected in Wacton churchyard. During my researches into Wacton's history I have identified a further 10 men listed as 'absent voters NM' in the register of electors for the year 1918 to 1920, and so far 7 men born in Wacton who served during the First World War that had left the village.

One thing that initially surprised me during my researches is the number of men who served in the 'Reserve' regiments. These regiments were used both for training men and horses, as horse drawn transport was then the major form of transport, and to accumulate the supplies of food for both the horses and men, then transport them to the front. Many men in these Reserve regiments were not drafted overseas until after the cessation of hostilities and they were engaged in the repair and rebuilding of roads and railways and generally tidying up the war ravaged countryside.

Other men and women associated with Wacton who have served in the Second World War and regular forces at other times have still to be researched.

Here at the practice we are constantly monitoring the planning and developments within the area and are in constant conversation with our landlords in Long Stratton, and the CCG (Clinical Commissioning Group) about premises, capacity, and the future.

Following the announcement last week (28.7.21) that the new bypass is definitely being funded by the Government with a completion date of late 2024, plus corresponding housing developments to the tune of around 1800 properties, we are very aware that our surgery needs to expand to accommodate circa 4000 new people.

According to NHSE (National Health Service England) data we would need to have an additional 4100 patients on our books, plus 400 at Newton before we would reach their expected population per square metre threshold for development to be considered. We are recruiting into our nursing team x 2 additional nurses, and now have a First Contact Physio Service and Mental Health service operating from the Practice sites seeing people face to face.

Keith, our Practice Manager is leading on the project of writing our Primary Care Network Estates Strategy and we are driving the Practice forward to be future proofed over the coming years.

Expansion plans have been drawn, it is now in the hands of the CCG, and NHSE to secure the funding for what the Partners and Landlords want to do on your behalf. Please rest assured – we are very much involved in providing a healthcare service to Long Stratton and the neighbouring villages for years to come!

Covid kids

"The pandemic is crushing our children." "Our children will never recover" One headline reported "Exams limbo has sent anxiety soaring." Another reported "Lockdown causes mental health problems in one in six youngsters."

Initial findings

In fact, discerning the true state of mental health through the pandemic is hard to do. As the Lancet recently acknowledged, "few studies around the world cover children." The evidence we have is mixed. A study of 168 children in the east of England, with an average age of 10, found an increase in depressive symptoms. However, a study of about 1000 children aged 13 and 14 in south-west England found little overall change in anxiety, depression and well-being.

What my pupils have taught me

As a maths tutor I learn much from my pupils. I have been impressed with their resilience and adaptability during a strange and difficult year. In spite of school closures and exam cancellations, many of my pupils have been positive and hopeful. Many have been even more eager to learn.

The most resilient generation in decades?

I am quietly optimistic that Covid kids may emerge stronger through the pandemic. Research shows that resilience comes from challenges and emerging even stronger. A soft, easy childhood is not necessarily the gift we imagine it to be. Today's children are learning to deal with feeling anxious, bored, lonely, worried, confused and more. They have more to deal with than is always visible. Far from crushing them, Covid could be the force that helps lead this generation to become the most resilient generation in decades.

Outline of our Village Past

The Age of Prosperity

We must imagine that the period from the Domesday Book (1086) onwards for the next 400-500 years was the most prosperous age in the whole history of our village, more prosperous than it has been at any time ever since. This was not due to any peculiar genius possessed by the people of Long Statton and Wacton alone, but to the prosperity of East Anglia at large. Norwich during these centuries grew to become the second greatest city of the kingdom, after London, and the parishes south of Norwich were some of the most thickly populated in the whole of England. The wool trade was the cause of this prosperity.

Welholmes and Snape Hall

In Stratton the old Saxon system of common open fields farmed by villagers in strips continued during the earlier centuries, overlaid by a bewildering maze of duties and obligations imposed upon the earlier inhabitants by the Norman conquoerors. The Norman Lord of the Manor was the great landowner of the district, and to him the Saxon tenant villagers owed service on an agreed quota of work-days. Generally called 'Stratton Hall' the lands of the manor of this district were parcelled up, shared up, and merged again and again in the course of the medieval centuries, but their ancient names have been preserved or revived for us still today, Rhees, Welholmes, Snape Hall and Sturmy.

Earliest Writing

In the early years following the Norman conquest, a ready means of distinction between Saxon serfs and Norman Lords of the Manor was by language, for whereas the Norman Lords of the Manor spoke French, the Saxons spoke only that development of their native tongue which was recognisably English. It is against the background of this bi-lingual situation that we must understand the first ever piece of writing from Long Stratton preserved to modern times. (1) It is an inscription found on a bell in 1734 and carefully recorded for us before the old bell was melted down and re-cast. It breathes the very atmosphere of feudal England with its clear divisions between baron and tenant, French and English.

> 'lesu en le hou de toi Sir John Styrmin fit feremoi Thomas made me'

The bell was cast in about 1330 by Thomas, the Saxon serf, at the command of Sir John Styrmyn, Lord of the Manor. In copying (indistinctly), the French inscription given him by Sir John, Thomas also added his own signature in the only language he could speak - English.

This article mentions Welholmes and Snape Hall - There were four other Manorial Houses in Strattons early days, this is what I know about the other Manors.

Stratton Hall up Hall lane was also known as Stratton St Mary's Manor or Bourne Hall in the reign of Richard 1st (1157-1199) it was the property of Richard Malherbe and in 1273 Gilbert de Bourne lived there. The Hall is the oldest of our Manorial houses, Whites Directory (1843) says the Hall that has a deep moat is now a farmhouse. In 1883 it says the Hall that has a deep moat has recently been rebuilt and the greater part of the Old Hall has disappeared. The Hall and its land was part of the Burroughes estate and in June 1910 was sold to RT Barnes for £3,300.

Snape Hall Manor

I'm not certain of the location of this Manor but it was in the middle of the village. It was sgranted to the Snape family. In1307 Stephen de Brockdish lived there, it was a house with sixty acres of land.

Sturmins, Sturmy, Sturmyns or Sturmer Manor

These are all different spellings of the Manor that I have found. I think this house was on Wood Green called after Robert le Sturmy, his son John was Lord of the Manor in 1262. In 1345 it was sold by John's son Robert to the Lord of Stratton Hall Manor. Bloomfields 1806 says the Manor House is now down.

Sayes Manor

This Manorial Manor was granted by the Bygods Lord of Forncett to William de Sy. In 1214 his son Jeffrey died, then it had many owners. The Manor was rebuilt in the 15th century and abandoned in 1605. It was an L shape and I think it was near St Michael's Church. In 1806 the Rev Mr Thomas Howes owned it.

Welholmes or Welhams Manor

I have no idea where this Manorial house stood, but I think it was in St Michael's. This Manor was granted by Stratton family to the Welholmes family and in 1274 it belonged to Robert de Welholmes.

Reese, Rees, Raze, Rhees, Rise (1878 1883 Whites Directory) Reeze(1905)

As you can see there are many spellings of this Manor which I think was on Rhees Green. In 1195 William de Stratton owned it. In 1270 Robert de Stratton sold part of the Manorial land to Richard de Boyland who joined it to his Manor of Boyland Hall. In 1806 John Howes was the owner.

Whatever happened to all the Manorial houses I do not know - the only one remaining is up Hall Lane. The Manor House that everyone thinks of was built much later and when we get to that part of Strattons History I will tell you more.

Information for this article was taken from the 1806 Bloomfields History of Norfolk's Towns, Villages and Hamlets, and also from White and Kelly's directories.

Earliest Writing - (1) Since this section was first written, more is known about the history of the bells. The ancient bell with the inscription is actually the original one, never having been melted down and recast. It dates from about 1320, cast almost certainly by Thomas Belleyetere of Kings Lynn. It is still rung regularly today as one of the six bells in St Mary's Tower, and is one of the oldest in the country still rung.

LOCAL WALKS

We met, as usual, at 10.00 a. m. for our highsummer walk, on what had to be said, was one of the better mornings for weather than we had enjoyed for a week or so. There were six of us, including a welcome new member, Elaine, who set off in two cars for our starting point in Forncett St Mary, which was planned and led this month by Bonnie. Commencing from the village



hall we turned Left into Cheyney's Lane, a gently rising, hedge-flanked country road, where a small herd of cattle in an adjacent field were, it seemed, also enjoying a gentle morning walk. We remained on this road for only about half a mile, taking the first turning left until reaching the first public footpath into open farmland. Along this route were fields of newly harvested corn and various groups of farm workers, busily stacking up bales. The machinery being used was a far cry from the methods in use when the writer was a boy! Indeed, a little nearer to Tacolneston, the bales became huge 'wheels' which seems to have become the preferred method in agriculture these days.

It was along this section of the walk that Bonnie suggested we keep an eye out for a pair of Red Kites which were patrolling the skies when she walked the route a week or so before. Alas, there was no sight of them on this occasion. It doesn't seem long ago that Red Kites were an endangered species, confined almost exclusively to western parts in the U.K. They can now be found through the length and breadth of the country.

Having reached the eastern outskirts of TacoIneston, we turned south, towards Forncett End, remaining on the public footpaths and walking into the sun. There was little breeze this day making the warmth of the sun very noticeable. Reaching the western end of Cheyney's Lane, we came across a charming part-thatched farmhouse, where we stopped, briefly, to admire the bee-friendly gardens which surrounded it.



The walk continued along the lane for a while, where we passed paddocks on both sides, each containing several horses, some of which came to the gate and demanded a bit of fussing. Striking off onto a footpath once more, passing a small flock of sheep, we came across a recently placed wooden seat which bore a brass plaque to a local man who, we subsequently learned, loved this particularly

peaceful spot and spent many hours there. It was then a relatively short distance back to Forncett St Mary, where we reached Low Road, a few hundred yards from the church and our starting point and the end of a well planned 4.5 mile walk.
